Ryan Mougengel is in his fifth season as head coach of the Providence Bruins and his eighth season with the club overall, guiding Providence to a record of 35-8-1-0 through 44 games so far in 2025-26. The Bruins own the best record in the Eastern Conference and enter the All-Star break on a 10-game winning streak.

Mougengel joined the Bruins as an assistant coach in 2018 after four seasons with the San Jose Sharks organization, serving as an AHL assistant coach in Worcester and San Jose. He also spent the 2013-14 season as an assistant coach with the Hershey Bears following eight years coaching in the ECHL.

Mougengel played six pro seasons as a forward, including 20 games with the Rochester Americans in 1999-2000.

Laval native Pascal Vincent is in his second season coaching the Rocket after guiding the team to the best record in the AHL (48-19-3-2, 101 points) in 2024-25. He was rewarded with the Louis A.R. Pieri Memorial Award as the AHL's outstanding coach, becoming the sixth two-time recipient of the award and the first ever to earn the honor with two different organizations.

Before joining Laval on July 16, 2024, Vincent spent the 2023-24 season as head coach of the NHL's Columbus Blue Jackets following two seasons as their associate coach. He spent 10 seasons with the Winnipeg Jets organization before that, including five years (2011-16) as an NHL assistant and five years (2016-21) as head coach of the AHL's Manitoba Moose.

Vincent was also a head coach in the QMJHL for 12 seasons with Cape Breton (1999-2008) and Montreal (2008-11).



Patrick Sharp

Eastern Conference Honorary Captain

Patrick Sharp played 163 games with the AHL's Philadelphia Phantoms over his first three seasons as a pro, totaling 54 goals and 114 points. He represented the Phantoms in the 2005 AHL All-Star Classic, and notched 21 points in 21 postseason contests – including a team-best four goals and six points in the Finals – as Philadelphia won the Calder Cup in 2005.

Sharp would go on to skate in 939 regular-season games and 142 playoff matches in the National Hockey League with the Philadelphia Flyers, Chicago Blackhawks and Dallas Stars, and was instrumental in the Blackhawks' Stanley Cup championships in 2010, 2013 and 2015.

The Winnipeg native also skated for Canada at the 2014 Olympics in Sochi, winning a gold medal.

Named head coach of the Griffins on June 14, 2023, Dan Watson is in his 17th season coaching in the Detroit Red Wings organization. He joined the ECHL's Toledo Walleye as an assistant in 2009 and was elevated to associate coach in 2014 before being named head coach of the club in 2016. He reached the ECHL's Kelly Cup Finals twice (2019, 2022) and was named the ECHL's coach of the year award in 2016-17.

He guided the Griffins to the Calder Cup Playoffs in each of his first two seasons in Grand Rapids, and has his team on a record pace in 2025-26 with an .811 points percentage (35-7-2-1) through 45 games.

An undrafted defenseman, Watson played in the AHL with the Syracuse Crunch, Cleveland Barons and Providence Bruins, appearing in 193 games between 2000 and 2004 as part of a seven-year pro career.

Mark Letestu is in his first season as a head coach in professional hockey after being hired to lead the Eagles on July 5, 2025. He came to Colorado following four seasons as an assistant coach with the AHL's Cleveland Monsters, a tenure which included a trip to the Eastern Conference Finals in 2024.

Letestu played 13 pro seasons between 2007 and 2020, including 255 games in the AHL with Wilkes-Barre/Scranton and Cleveland. He was a three-time 20-goal scorer in the AHL, and helped the Penguins reach the Calder Cup Finals in 2008.

In 567 contests in the NHL with Pittsburgh, Columbus, Edmonton and Winnipeg, Letestu totaled 93 goals and 117 assists.

Kris Versteeg skated in 145 games in the AHL during his career, suiting up for the Providence Bruins, Norfolk Admirals and Rockford IceHogs. In 2006-07, he tallied 26 goals and 72 points in 70 games to finish fourth among all AHL rookies in scoring.

Versteeg went on to appear in 643 games over 11 seasons in the NHL with Chicago, Toronto, Philadelphia, Florida, Carolina, Los Angeles and Calgary. He was named to the NHL's All-Rookie Team in 2008-09, and won Stanley Cup championships with the Blackhawks in 2010 and 2015.

HISTORY OF THE AHL ALL-STAR CLASSIC



The AHL All-Star Classic has roots dating all the way back to the infancy of the league. Since being resurrected in 1995, the American Hockey League All-Star Classic has evolved into a mid-season showcase event for the outstanding young talent in the sport: Approximately 95 percent of the players who have participated in the Classic have seen action in the NHL.

1941-42 AHL All-Star Game

February 3, 1942 - Cleveland Arena - Cleveland, Ohio

East All-Stars 5, West All-Stars 4

The American Hockey League's first All-Star Game was held in 1942 and featured an East/West split of the 10-team circuit. Thanks to a crowd of 3,580 fans, nearly \$5,000 was netted from the proceeds of the evening to aid soldiers from both Canada and the United States who were fighting overseas.

Norm Burns of the New Haven Eagles scored the first All-Star goal in AHL history, and later added a second goal and an assist to lead the East side to a 5-4 victory. The game was tied at 1-1 until late in the second period, when Springfield's Pete Kelly put the East back in front. Each team then scored three times in the third period, with the East team building a 5-2 lead before the West scored at 18:31 and 18:53 to make it close.

Providence's Bun Cook coached the East All-Stars to victory, while his brother Bill Cook was behind the bench for the West squad.

HISTORY OF THE AHL ALL-STAR CLASSIC

1954-55 AHL All-Star Game

October 27, 1954 – Hershey Sports Arena – Hershey, Pa.

AHL All-Stars 7, Cleveland Barons 3

When the AHL All-Star Game was reborn during the 1954-55 season, the AHL adopted the same format as the National Hockey League, pitting the defending Calder Cup champions against a team of All-Stars from the rest of the league.

The game was held at the Hershey Sports Arena (now known as Hersheypark Arena), and Dunc Fisher of the hometown Bears was the star of the show. Fisher scored three times and added an assist as the AHL All-Stars defeated the defending champion Cleveland Barons, 7-3.

Fisher's Hershey teammate Arnie Kullman added a goal and three assists, and Springfield's Harry Pidhirny scored twice, as the AHL All-Stars peppered future Hall of Famer Emile Francis with 46 shots at the Cleveland net. Frank Mathers and Willie Marshall each recorded two assists.

Cleveland's Fred Glover opened the scoring just 45 seconds into the contest, but the AHL All-Stars would race to a 5-1 lead after two periods. Pittsburgh's Gil Mayer and Hershey's Gordie Henry split the duties in net for the All-Stars.

HISTORY OF THE AHL ALL-STAR CLASSIC

1955-56 AHL All-Star Game January 10, 1956 – The Gardens – Pittsburgh, Pa. AHL All-Stars 4, Pittsburgh Hornets 4 (OT)

The All-Star Game was moved to mid-season in 1955-56 as the defending Calder Cup champion Pittsburgh Hornets hosted the AHL All-Stars.

The Hornets spent much of the evening playing come-from-behind hockey. Despite taking a 1-0 lead midway through the first period, Pittsburgh trailed 3-1 before Bob Hassard scored with 18 seconds left in the second, and Joe Klukay netted his second goal of the game to tie the score early in the third.

Ken Wharram, on his way to a 90-point season with Buffalo, put the All-Stars back in front, but the Hornets weren't done. Hornets coach Howie Meeker pulled goalie Gil Mayer in favor of an extra attacker, and Willie Marshall scored with 1:05 remaining to tie the score at 4-4. A 10-minute overtime period decided nothing, and the 1955-56 All-Star Game ended as the only tie in event history.

The game actually featured 20 minutes in penalties and eight power plays (four aside), both AHL All-Star records.

Providence Reds 4, AHL All-Stars 0

Less than two weeks after the start of the 1956-57 season, the defending champion Providence Reds hosted a team of AHL All-Stars at the Rhode Island Auditorium. Johnny Bower, who led Providence to a four-game sweep of Cleveland in the 1956 finals, was the story on this night.

Bower finished with 47 saves against the potent All-Stars, including 22 in the second period, to post the only shutout in AHL All-Star history. The Reds' 4-0 victory was the first win in the series for the defending champions over an AHL All-Star team.

Jim Bartlett led Providence's offense with a goal and two assists. Camille Henry, who scored 50 goals with the Reds the previous year, tallied a goal after being loaned to Providence for the game by the New York Rangers.

1957-58 AHL All-Star Game **October 6, 1957 – War Memorial – Rochester, N.Y.** **AHL All-Stars 5, Cleveland Barons 2**

Due to the tremendous support received by the Rochester Americans during their expansion 1956-57 season, the War Memorial was selected to host the 1957-58 AHL All-Star Game. The Amerks lost to the Cleveland Barons in the 1957 Calder Cup Finals.

After a scoreless first period, the All-Stars took a lead on a goal by Rochester's Paul Masnick, who would wind up spending the entire 1957-58 season with the Toronto Maple Leafs. After Bill Shvetz and Dan Poliziani gave the Barons a 2-1 lead through two periods, the AHL All-Stars took over.

Jimmy Anderson of Springfield scored a pair of third-period goals, Willie Marshall netted the game-winning tally and Dunc Fisher scored his fourth career All-Star goal as the AHL All-Stars posted a 5-2 victory.

Hershey Bears 5, AHL All-Stars 2

For the first time, AHL fans voted for members of the AHL All-Star team as the Hershey Bears hosted the event for the second time. Fans selected a First Team and Second Team, and Cleveland's Jack Gordon and Buffalo's Bobby Kirk rounded out the roster.

After most of the first period went by scoreless, Larry Zeidel got the Bears on the board at 19:42. Midway through the second, Bob Solinger beat Buffalo goaltender Marcel Paille with what remains the only shorthanded goal in AHL All-Star history, and Ed Stankiewicz upped Hershey's lead to 3-0 by the end of the frame.

It was 4-0 before Rochester's Cecil Hoekstra scored on a power play to get the All-Stars on the board and end Bobby Perreault's shutout bid. With Zeidel and Howie Yanosik leading the way with a goal and an assist each, Hershey rolled to a 5-2 victory.

Perreault finished with 22 saves, while Paille and Rochester's Gerry McNeil combined for 23 saves in net for the All-Stars.

December 10, 1959 – Eastern States Coliseum – West Springfield, Mass.

Springfield Indians 8, AHL All-Stars 3

The Hershey Bears were the defending Calder Cup champions in 1959-60, but because the Bears hosted the game the year before, and the Indians were the only one of the original six teams yet to host the game or play against a team of All-Stars, Springfield was given the honor. (The decision proved to be a good one – the Indians went on to claim the 1960 championship.)

The AHL All-Stars jumped out to a 2-0 lead on goals by Cleveland's Fred Glover and Buffalo's Larry Wilson in the first 9:45 of the game. But Ian Cushenan got Springfield on the board 62 seconds later, and the Indians were off to the races. Dennis Olson tied the score with the first of his two goals, and Harry Pidhirny put the Indians up 3-2 after two periods.

The home team scored five more times in the final stanza and cruised to an 8-3 victory over the All-Stars. Bill Sweeney, who would win three straight AHL scoring titles from 1961-63, picked up two goals and an assist for the Indians, and Bruce Cline (1g, 2a), Parker MacDonald (3a) and Bill McCreary (3a) each pitched in with three points also. Brian Kilrea, who would go on to become the most successful Canadian junior coach in history, notched two assists.

Lorne "Gump" Worsley was tested by the AHL All-Stars, and finished with 36 saves for Springfield. Bobby Perreault of Hershey stopped 13 shots, but the Indians did most of their damage against Rochester's Ed Chadwick, who allowed six goals on 23 shots.

In his first season at the helm, AHL President David Andrews resurrected the league's All-Star Game in 1994-95 and awarded the honor of hosting the first renewal of the event to the Providence Bruins.

The new format of the game saw players from the AHL's United States-based teams competing against players from the league's Canadian teams. The head coach of the defending Calder Cup champions was automatically named to coach one team, with the other coach coming from the team with the best points percentage at a designated deadline prior to the game. Fans voted for the starting lineups of both sides.

The AHL announced an affiliation with ESPN to produce and televise the game, and with TSN and RDS in Canada joining the partnership, the league had the first national broadcast exposure for its showcase event.

Despite having just six franchises to choose its All-Stars from, the Canadian squad had the firepower to post a 6-4 victory in front of 11,909 fans at a sold-out Providence Civic Center. Defensemen accounted for each of the game's first four goals, and MVP Ralph Intranuovo broke a 2-2 tie midway through the second period to put Canada on top for good.

Dwayne Roloson stopped all 11 shots he faced to earn the victory in net, as Canada's goaltenders combined to make 39 saves on 43 U.S. shots.

As the AHL celebrated its 60th anniversary, the AHL All-Star Game returned to venerable Hersheypark Arena, site of the event in 1954 and 1959. The showcase was re-named the AHL All-Star Classic, and introduced the first AHL Skills Competition, held the day before the All-Star Game.

The Reese's AHL Skills Competition featured events such as shooting accuracy, puck control and rapid fire. St. John's defenseman Jamie Heward registered 99.7 miles per hour on the radar gun in the hardest shot event, and Cape Breton's Ralph Intranuovo won the fastest skater competition with a lap of 13.683 seconds; both marks still stand as AHL records. The U.S. won the Skills Competition by a score of 14-12.

Looking to make it a clean sweep of the All-Star Classic, the U.S. AHL All-Stars spotted Canada a lead just 29 seconds into the game, and then scored five times themselves before the first period was over. Wes Walz, who would earn MVP honors, notched a goal and two assists in the opening period, and the U.S. survived a late Canadian attack to earn a 6-5 victory.

The defending Calder Cup champion Albany River Rats were well-represented, with head coach Robbie Ftorek leading a U.S. AHL All-Star club that included Steve Sullivan, Ricard Persson, Brad Bombardir, Geordie Kinnear and Mike Dunham. St. John's head coach Tom Watt had six of his Maple Leafs on his Canadian squad, including starting goaltender Marcel Cousineau.

The first AHL All-Star Classic to be played in Canada introduced a new format, and wound up being one of the most exciting games in the event's history.

For the first time, the AHL's mid-season showcase pitted Canadian-born players against those from outside Canada, dubbed the World AHL All-Stars. The World squad cruised to an 18-9 victory in the Skills Competition, setting the stage for a competitive All-Star Game.

A sold-out Harbour Station in Saint John welcomed the AHL's brightest stars, and it was the goaltenders who outshined everyone else. The six netminders combined to stop 84 of 88 shots as the teams skated to a 2-2 tie through three 20-minute periods and a five-minute overtime. Portland's Robb Stauber led the way, stopping all 20 Canadian shots in the second frame.

The AHL borrowed a page from international competition and went to a shootout to determine the winner. Craig Charron and Chris Ferraro scored on the World team's first two attempts, and Tomas Vokoun denied the hometown Flames' Marty Murray on Canada's fifth and final shot, as the World AHL All-Stars prevailed 2-1 in the shootout, earning a 3-2 victory in the All-Star Game. Vokoun was named the game's MVP, making 19 saves on 20 shots (including seven in overtime), and then shutting the door on four of the Canadians' five shootout attempts.

With the NHL suspending play for the Olympic Games in Nagano, the AHL moved its All-Star Classic to February and headed to the historic Onondaga County War Memorial for the 1998 edition of the event. The format remained the same, with the Canadian AHL All-Stars taking on the newly-named PlanetUSA AHL All-Stars. Adding spice to the 1998 AHL All-Star Classic was the fierce Mid-Atlantic Division rivalry between the two coaches: Bob Hartley of the defending Calder Cup champion Hershey Bears, and Hall of Famer Bill Barber of the Philadelphia Phantoms.

The PlanetUSA team once again claimed the Skills Competition, by a 13-8 margin. Jamie Heward became a two-time winner of the hardest shot event, clocking a shot at 99.3 miles per hour, and Phantoms goaltender Brian Boucher won the goaltending portion of the event, stopping 13 of 14 shots in the rapid fire and breakaway relay.

The 1998 All-Star Game proved to be the opposite of the low-scoring defensive gem turned in the previous season. The PlanetUSA All-Stars had a 3-0 lead less than six minutes into the game, but the Canadian team needed less than a period to turn a 6-2 deficit into a 10-6 lead. By the midway point of the third, PlanetUSA had evened the score at 10-10.

Peter Zezel scored his second goal of the game with 8:31 remaining, and Scott Langkow did the rest, finishing with 22 third-period saves as the Canadian AHL All-Stars held on for an 11-10 victory. The two teams set 12 All-Star records in the game, including most total scored (21) and total shots (106). All told, 31 of the 39 skaters got on the scoresheet, with no one recording more than two goals or three points.

The First Union Center in Philadelphia, home of the NHL's Flyers, served as the site of the 1999 First Union AHL All-Star Classic, hosted by the defending Calder Cup champion Philadelphia Phantoms. For the first time in four tries, the Canadian AHL All-Stars earned victory in the IcePro AHL All-Star Skills Competition, winning the event 15-12.

A crowd of 14,120 fans, then an AHL All-Star record, witnessed the fourth consecutive one-goal margin in the All-Star Game. The PlanetUSA AHL All-Stars took a 3-1 lead into the third period, but needed a Valentin Morozov goal with 1:18 remaining in regulation to force a 4-4 tie. PlanetUSA then weathered a Canadian power play in overtime, and for the second time in three years, the AHL All-Star Game headed to a shootout.

It was déjà vu once the shootout began, as Chris Ferraro netted the game-winning goal, just as he did in 1997. This time, he beat Hamilton teammate Steve Passmore, as PlanetUSA's shooters edged their Canadian counterparts, 2-1, giving the home team a 5-4 victory. Jean-Marc Pelletier of the Phantoms was named MVP, as he turned aside 17 of 18 Canadian shots in the first period.

More than 42 years after hosting the 1957 All-Star Game, the refurbished Blue Cross Arena at the Rochester War Memorial was the site of the 2000 Kodak AHL All-Star Classic. The PlanetUSA AHL All-Stars won the Skills Competition, 17-12, for their fourth victory in five years. But the Canadian team stole the show in the main event.

Kentucky's Miikka Kiprusoff, who won the goaltending portion of the Skills Competition on Sunday evening, allowed four goals on 15 shots in the first period on Monday afternoon, and the Canadian AHL All-Stars raced to a 6-0 lead before Rochester-area native Marty Reasoner finally got PlanetUSA on the board at 11:32 of the second.

The Canadians' balanced attack saw 17 of their 19 skaters record a point, and game MVP Martin Brochu turned in the best All-Star goaltending performance since Johnny Bower's shutout in October 1956, stopping all 23 shots faced in the first period.

A crowd of 10,588 fans watched the game in person, and the event was once again televised on ESPN2, TSN, RDS and numerous regional sports networks, providing international coverage across North and Central America.

There were countless story lines as the 2001 First Union AHL All-Star Classic unfolded in Wilkes-Barre, Pa. The hometown Penguins, in their second year in the AHL, had already sold out their entire home schedule for the remainder of the regular season and were on their way to an appearance in the Calder Cup Finals. But hours before Sunday's All-Star Skills Competition, Pittsburgh traded Wilkes-Barre/Scranton captain John Slaney to Philadelphia in exchange for Kevin Stevens. Slaney, who had been voted a starter for the Canadian squad, would soon become a member of the arch-rival Philadelphia Phantoms, and the AHL's showcase event became Wilkes-Barre's chance to bid farewell to their departing hero.

An emotional ovation greeted Slaney during the player introductions before the Skills Competition, as he hit the ice in his Penguins jersey for the last time. Portland's Mark Murphy (96.8 mph) won the hardest shot event, helping PlanetUSA to a 16-8 victory, their fifth win in six years. In Monday's All-Star Game, the Canadian AHL All-Stars erased early 2-0 and 3-2 deficits, and led 6-4 after the first period. Slaney sent the sell-out crowd of 8,314 into a frenzy with a second-period goal, giving Canada a 9-5 edge.

PlanetUSA stormed back, and head coaches John Paddock and Bill Armstrong, of rivals Hartford and Providence, respectively, saw their teams knotted at 10-10 with time winding down. Then, with 4:54 to play, Bruins forward Eric Manlow, playing for Paddock's Canadian team, beat Wolf Pack and PlanetUSA goaltender Vitali Yermeyev to break the tie, and Canada held on for an 11-10 victory. Slaney, who finished with a goal and two assists, was named MVP of the game. Manlow finished with a goal and three assists, Penguin Greg Crozier had a goal and two assists, and St. John's forward Bobby House scored twice. Louisville's Denis Shvidki set All-Star records with four assists and five points to lead PlanetUSA.

The red carpet was rolled out for the 2002 AHL All-Star Classic, and the event had a decidedly Canadian flavor. The people of St. John's, Nfld., lived up to their hospitable reputation and served as gracious hosts for the event in North America's easternmost city.

Sold-out crowds at the brand new Mile One Stadium cheered the home team to a sweep of the week's events, beginning with a convincing 21-9 rout in Wednesday's Skills Competition. Canadian netminders Neil Little and Travis Scott shared the goaltenders' competition title, stopping 17 of 19 shots apiece, while Providence's Jonathan Girard became the first player to win both the Hardest Shot (99.0 mph) and Fastest Skater (14.262 sec.) events.

With the Olympic Games underway in Salt Lake City, the NHL had shut down its season, allowing the AHL All-Star Game to take center stage on Thursday night. The Canadian AHL All-Stars jumped out to leads of 3-0 and 6-2, but the PlanetUSA squad scored four quick goals early in the third period to take a 10-8 lead. Canada rebounded, snapping a 10-10 tie on Tom Kostopoulos's goal with just 1:31 remaining, then holding on for a 13-11 victory. The game was the highest-scoring in AHL All-Star history, and saw no fewer than 18 All-Star records set or tied. Cleveland's Mike Craig and hometown Maple Leafs hero Jeff Farkas each scored three goals, recording the first All-Star hat tricks since 1955. Craig added two assists for a record-tying five points, and earned the game's MVP honors.

Manchester defenseman Rich Brennan was selected to captain the PlanetUSA team and was voted a starter in fan balloting, and joined Fred Glover and Dunc Fisher as the only six-time AHL All-Stars by playing the game's first shift despite a broken wrist.

As the city of Portland celebrated 25 years as home to the American Hockey League, the AHL returned the All-Star Classic to New England for the first time since 1995. The Canadians took to the ice looking to repeat their two-day sweep of the skills competition and game.

Chicago Wolves defenseman Kurtis Foster, an injury replacement on the Canadian roster, proved his worth in the hardest shot event by registering 101.0 miles an hour, shattering the league's seven-year-old record. Rookie phenom Jason Spezza claimed the puck control relay, Justin Papineau won the fastest skater competition and Trent Hunter took the accuracy shooting, leading Canada to a 15-13 victory on the day.

Three months after the tragic death of his wife Jennifer from cancer, Pirates forward Chris Ferraro served as co-captain of the PlanetUSA team with his brother Peter in front of their hometown Portland fans. Looking to snap a three-year losing streak, PlanetUSA took leads of 3-1 and 7-5, but the Canadian All-Stars scored the final five goals to post a 10-7 win.

Utah's Jon Sim, with two goals and an assist, was named the game's MVP. Hershey's Charlie Stephens and Milwaukee's Darren Haydar also recorded three points apiece, as did Philadelphia's John Slaney, who became the all-time leading scorer in AHL All-Star Game history with eight career points. Binghamton's rookie goaltender Ray Emery stopped all nine shots he faced in the third period to earn the win in net.

Grand Rapids became the westernmost city to host an AHL All-Star event as the stars rose at Van Andel Arena in 2004. The Canadians entered the Classic looking to continue its domination of the two-day gathering.

Michigan native Ryan Miller was brilliant in the Skills Competition, stopping 22 of the 25 attempts he faced on the evening and leading PlanetUSA to an 18-9 win. But the festivities were clouded by injuries: Chicago's Kari Lehtonen, suffering the after-effects of a concussion, opted not to risk further harm and stayed on the bench. Nathan Robinson of the hometown Griffins took a spill during the fastest skater event. And Portland's Rastislav Stana suffered a shoulder injury and withdrew from Monday's game.

With two goaltenders out of action, Springfield's David LeNeveu, who was Canada's top goalie in the Skills Competition, made an unprecedented switch of locker rooms and joined PlanetUSA for the All-Star Game.

The Canadians never trailed in pursuit of their fifth consecutive All-Star victory, and blew the game open with five goals in the second period, thanks in large part to a goal and two assists from game MVP Mike Zigomanis of Lowell. Hartford's Chad Wiseman and Hamilton's Benoit Gratton also recorded three points and rookie defenseman Aaron Johnson of Syracuse scored twice. Wilkes-Barre/Scranton's Matt Murley picked up two goals and an assist to lead PlanetUSA.

With 22 saves in 29 minutes of work, Binghamton's Ray Emery earned the win in net for the Canadians, becoming just the second goaltender ever to post two career All-Star Game victories.

With the National Hockey League still in the midst of a lockout, the 2005 Dodge AHL All-Star Classic became arguably the most talent-rich event in AHL history. The Canadian AHL All-Stars came to Manchester on a five-year winning streak in the All-Star Game, but PlanetUSA set the tone early that this Classic would be a different story.

Norfolk Admirals rookie Rene Bourque hit the post on his first attempt in the hardest shot contest, then came back to register 99.8 mph on the clock for the Canadians, and Jason Spezza of Binghamton won the individual puck control relay for the second time in his career, but it would not prove to be enough for the Canadians in the Skills Competition. Providence Bruins forward Andy Hilbert, in his third AHL All-Star Classic for PlanetUSA, recorded the AHL's first-ever perfect performance in the accuracy shooting event, breaking four targets in four shots. Hamilton's Tomas Plekanec captured the fastest skater title with a time of 14.196 seconds. And Rochester's Ryan Miller dominated the goaltending competition for the second year in a row, stopping 15 of 19 shots on the evening to lead PlanetUSA to a 17-13 victory, their fourth Skills win in six years.

The Canadians took early control of the All-Star Game the next night, scoring four times in the first period. Michel Ouellet of Wilkes-Barre/Scranton recorded a goal and an assist during the outburst and Hershey's Eric Perrin tallied the first All-Star shorthanded goal since 1959. But PlanetUSA stormed back, with Houston Aeros rookie Mikko Koivu tying the score at 4-4 midway through the third period. Still tied after regulation, the game went directly to a shootout, where Ryan Miller denied Jason Spezza, Kyle Wellwood and Chuck Kobasew while PlanetUSA shooters went 3-for-3 against Manchester's Mathieu Garon. It was the third shootout win for PlanetUSA in All-Star history.

Flaherty was brilliant in stopping 16 of 19 shots on the evening, including a 6-for-6 effort in the breakaway relay, the first perfect performance by a goalie in that event since 1999. PlanetUSA took an early lead in the All-Star Game the next night, with rookie phenom Patrick O'Sullivan of the Houston Aeros celebrating his 21st birthday with a goal. But the Canadian club roared back with seven consecutive scores of their own, one shy of the All-Star record, to take a 7-1 lead late in the second period. A late surge by PlanetUSA was snuffed out when Donald MacLean and Martin St. Pierre each scored his second goal of the night, and the Canadians closed out a 9-4 victory.

After claiming top goaltender honors in the Skills Competition, Wade Flaherty again thrilled the capacity crowd of 15,015 in Winnipeg and shared game MVP honors with Yann Danis of the Hamilton Bulldogs. Both netminders stopped 12 of 13 shots in their 20 minutes of work for Canada.

Canada's largest city played host to the American Hockey League's biggest show as the All-Star Classic took place at Ricoh Coliseum in Toronto, but the partisan Canadian crowd saw its team swept in the two-day event for the second time in three years.

Dustin Byfuglien won the hardest shot contest with a blast clocked at 98.7 miles per hour, becoming the third member of the Norfolk Admirals in four years to win the event. Erik Westrum of the hometown Toronto Marlies won the individual puck control relay and the Springfield Falcons' Karri Ramo was named the winner of the Top Goaltender award after stopping 15 of 19 Canadian shots.

Rochester's Clarke MacArthur took the accuracy shooting competition by hitting four targets in five attempts and Wilkes-Barre/Scranton's Jonathan Filewich recorded a time of 14.553 seconds to claim the fastest skater prize.

Despite falling into an early 2-0 hole, the Canadians took a 5-2 lead into the late stages of the second period and appeared to be on their way to a split of the two-day Classic. But PlanetUSA rallied twice to tie the game at 6-6, then got a goal from Hartford Wolf Pack rookie Ryan Callahan with just 3.3 seconds remaining to propel the visitors to a thrilling 7-6 victory.

Brett Sterling of the Chicago Wolves, in the middle of one of the most successful rookie seasons in American Hockey League history, capture game MVP honors with two goals and two assists for PlanetUSA.

The quaint Broome County Veterans Memorial Arena in Binghamton, N.Y., rocked for two nights as the AHL All-Star Classic came to town.

The Rochester Americans have long been archrivals of Binghamton's AHL clubs, but the Amerks' Mark Mancari won over the crowd in the Skills Competition by hitting 102.8 miles an hour in the hardest shot event, shattering the previous league record. Grand Rapids defenseman Jonathan Ericsson also hit triple digits (100.1), a feat that had only been accomplished once in 12 previous competitions.

Mancari's efforts were not enough for the Canadians, as Albany's Keith Aucoin took the individual puck control relay, Iowa's Toby Petersen claimed the fastest skater title and Manchester's Gabe Gauthier was a perfect 4-for-4 in the accuracy shooting to help PlanetUSA to a 15-9 victory. Milwaukee's Pekka Rinne won the top goaltender award after stopping 16 of 19 shots on the evening.

Monday night's All-Star Game was another highly competitive affair that featured the first penalty shot in AHL All-Star history (a goal by Toby Petersen) and the fastest two goals in event history (eight seconds). It also featured just the fourth hat trick by an AHL All-Star, as Manchester Monarchs rookie Teddy Purcell scored three times.

Bridgeport's Jeff Tambellini capped a comeback with 5:29 left in regulation and Purcell finished off his MVP performance with the decisive shootout goal to give the Canadians a 9-8 victory. It was the eighth time in 14 years that the AHL All-Star Game was decided by a single goal.

The American Hockey League's All-Star festivities came to Massachusetts for the first time since 1959 as the DCU Center and the city of Worcester hosted the 2009 event.

The All-Star Classic opened with a strong showing from both sides in the Skills Competition. The Canadians took the hardest shot event on the strength of Derek Joslin's 98.6-mph blast and Mike Santorelli was a perfect 4-for-4 in the accuracy shooting. But Manitoba's Cory Schneider, a Massachusetts native and Boston College product, was the difference in net, stopping 18 of 19 shots as PlanetUSA rolled to an 18-12 win and its fifth Skills victory in six years.

The All-Star Game made for another record-setting night. Corey Locke of the Houston Aeros became the first player ever to score four goals in an AHL All-Star Game, and 2008 game MVP Teddy Purcell of the Manchester Monarchs recorded five assists on the night to pace the Canadian offense. Derek MacKenzie, Danny Syvret, Kyle Cumiskey, Mark Mancari and Bryan Helmer all had multiple-point performances for Canada as well.

But PlanetUSA erupted for a record nine goals in the third period, turning an 8-5 deficit into a 14-11 win in the highest-scoring AHL All-Star Game in history. Springfield's Ryan Potulny (2g, 4a), Wilkes-Barre/Scranton's Jeff Taffe (3g, 2a) and Providence's Martins Karsums (2g, 3a) all had at least five points on the night, but it was Jared Ross of the Philadelphia Phantoms who grabbed MVP honors, setting event records with six assists and seven points.

The AHL All-Stars returned to Portland, site of the 2003 event, as the 2010 Time Warner Cable AHL All-Star Classic was held at the Cumberland County Civic Center. The Canadian squad was out to end PlanetUSA's three-year winning streak in the Skills Competition, but trailed 5-3 after three events thanks largely to Hartford's Bobby Sanguinetti setting an event record with a time of 13.677 seconds in claiming the fastest skater crown. But Canada boasted both the hardest shot in Norfolk's Blair Jones (100.7 mph) and the accuracy shooting champion in Adirondack's Jon Matsumoto (4-for-5), and rode Reebok Top Goaltender Cedrick Desjardins of Hamilton (16 saves on 19 shots) to an 18-12 victory.

The Canadians needed just 47 seconds to open the scoring in the All-Star Game the next night, but fell behind 5-2 after the first period as Manitoba's Sergei Shirokov and Chicago's Brett Sterling each scored twice in the opening frame. The format for the AHL All-Star Classic changed in 2011, pitting the East against the West for the first time since the inaugural game in 1942. Hershey hosted the All-Star festivities for the fourth time, but the first at Giant Center.

The two-time defending Calder Cup champion Bears were well represented on their home ice, and defenseman Brian Fahey helped the Eastern Conference's cause in the Skills Competition by taking the hardest shot event with a blast of 96.9 miles per hour. For the first time ever, the AHL's All-Star Classic was played at a non-league site as historic Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City, N.J., welcomed the game's brightest stars to the Jersey Shore.

After being swept in both ends of the 2011 event, the Western Conference came out looking for a measure of revenge. Ben Bishop of the Peoria Rivermen, who led the AHL with six shutouts at the All-Star break, helped backstop the West to an 18-10 victory in the Skills Competition, stopping 16 of 19 shots to earn the Reebok Top Goaltender accolade. Chicago's Kevin Connauton secured the hardest shot title with a blast clocked at 99.4 miles per hour, and Brian Connelly, representing Abbotsford less than 48 hours after being acquired by the Calgary Flames, won the fastest skater event with a lap timed at 13.851 seconds.

The East came out flying in the All-Star Game, with Connecticut's Jonathan Audy-Marchessault chipping in three points during a six-goal first period. The Western Conference's goaltending trio of Barry Brust, Petr Mrazek and Justin Peters combined to stop the last 14 Eastern Conference attempts in the breakaway relay, allowing the West to complete a 12-11 victory after it had trailed 7-2 with three events remaining. Rochester's Brayden McNabb became the fifth player in the history of the Skills Competition to crack triple digits in the hardest shot event (101.8 mph), and Texas's Matt Fraser won the accuracy shooting title by breaking four targets in five tries. In the fastest skater races, Houston's Jason Zucker (13.550 seconds) set an all-time event record, only to be bettered by Portland's Chris Summers (13.324).

In the All-Star Game the next night, Toronto forward Ryan Hamilton completed a hat trick with just 11.2 seconds remaining in regulation to break a tie and send the Western Conference to a 7-6 victory. Hamilton, who was named the game's MVP, scored the West's final three goals of the evening to record the seventh hat trick in All-Star Game history. The AHL All-Star Classic took on an international flavor in 2014 as Färjestad BK, one of the top professional teams in the Swedish Hockey League, took on a team of AHL All-Stars at Mile One Centre in St. John's. The two-day event marked the first time ever that a Swedish team competed in North America.

AHL All-Star captain Jason Jaffray of the hometown St. John's IceCaps played the role of hero in one of the most exciting Skills Competitions to date. Jaffray's goal in the final attempt of the breakaway relay tied the score, and he then converted in the third sudden-death shootout round to give the AHL side an 18-17 win. Färjestad defenseman Magnus Nygren shattered the event record in the hardest shot competition with a blast of 104.6 miles per hour, and shared the accuracy shooting title with Jaffray and Bridgeport's Ryan Strome as all three skaters broke four targets in six tries. The teams split the puck control relay event, highlighted by 16-year-old Färjestad rookie Oliver Kyllington outracing AHL scoring leader Travis Morin of Texas in their one-on-one heat. Binghamton's Mike Hoffman won the fastest skater event with a time of 13.990 seconds, and Hamilton's Dustin Tokarski was the CCM Top Goaltender after stopping 16 of 24 shots on the night.

In the All-Star Game, the AHL got three points each from Rockford's Brandon Pirri and Binghamton's Mike Hoffman en route to a 7-2 victory. Pirri, who had won the AHL scoring title in 2012-13, netted two goals and an assist and was named the game's most valuable player; Hoffman was selected as the AHL player of the game, while forward Christian Berglund was named the player of the game for Färjestad. Bridgeport rookie Ryan Strome scored twice for the AHL, and Chicago's Jake Allen and Hamilton's Dustin Tokarski combined to stop 34 of 36 shots in net.

The historic Utica Memorial Auditorium and the Utica Comets served as hosts for an exciting AHL All-Star Classic in 2015.

Colin Miller of the Manchester Monarchs was the brightest star during the Skills Competition, becoming just the second player ever to win both the fastest skater (13.805 seconds) and hardest shot (105.5 mph, an all-time record) events in the same year. Hartford's Chris Bourque was a co-winner of the accuracy shooting contest, an event his father Ray won eight times in the National Hockey League, and Hershey's Philipp Grubauer was the CCM Top Goaltender after stopping 16 shots on 19 attempts on the evening.

Monday saw the highest-scoring All-Star Game in AHL history, with the Western Conference holding on for a 14-12 victory. Hamilton's Charles Hudon, Milwaukee's Brendan Leipsic and Rockford's Mark McNeill all recorded hat tricks for the West, leading a parade of 17 different players who scored a goal on the night. Rockford defenseman T.J. Brennan notched a goal and four assists and Chicago's Ty Rattie added a goal and three assists for the West. Hudon and Utica's Jacob Markstrom, who allowed just two goals on 18 shots in his period of work, shared MVP honors.

Binghamton's Shane Prince led the Eastern Conference with three goals and an assist, and Norfolk's Chris Wagner scored on a penalty shot while also tallying three assists. Portland's Brendan Shinnimin scored twice, notched an assist and recorded 10 of the East's 59 shots on goal in the game.

The AHL All-Star Classic headed to the west coast for the first time in 2020, with the Ontario Reign serving as event hosts.

The home crowd was electrified in the Skills Competition by Reign forward Martin Frk, whose blast of 109.2 miles per hour in the hardest shot event shattered the previous AHL record — and also surpassed the NHL mark of 108.8 mph set by Zdeno Chara in 2011. Belleville's Alex Formenton won the fastest skater event with a time of 13.356, the third-fastest in the competition's history, and Charles Hudon of Laval won the accuracy shooting event by hitting four targets in five attempts.

Following two cancellations due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Laval Rocket finally welcomed the AHL's brightest stars to beautiful Place Bell in 2023.

The record books were rewritten during the Skills Competition, with Hershey rookie Ethen Frank becoming the first player to complete his fastest skater lap in under 13 seconds (12.915), and Rockford's David Gust getting the first 4-for-4 in the accuracy shooting event since 2009. Syracuse's Darren Raddysh won the hardest shot event with a blast of 102.0 mph and Toronto's Joseph Woll (15 saves) won the Top Goaltender competition as the Eastern Conference pulled out a 16-10 victory.

A thrilling All-Star Challenge saw the Atlantic Division prevail in an 11-round shootout to advance to the championship game, but Bakersfield's Seth Griffith scored his fifth goal of the night and the duo of Calgary's Dustin Wolf and San Diego's Lukas Dostal posted a shutout in the final to give the Pacific Division the title. Wolf and Dostal combined to stop 42 of 49 shots over 46 minutes of work to share MVP honors for the event.

The AHL All-Star Classic came to the Bay Area as San Jose Barracuda played host at their new Tech CU Arena.

In the Skills Competition, Ontario rookie Brandt Clarke became the fifth player ever to go 4-for-4 in the accuracy shooting event, and he also outraced his older brother, Utica's Graeme Clarke, to win a point for the Western Conference in the puck control relay. Colorado's Riley Tufte won the hardest shot competition with a blast clocked at 100.9 miles an hour, and Hershey's Ethen Frank won his second consecutive fastest skater title with a time of 13.032 seconds; only his record-setting lap of 12.915 seconds in 2023 has been faster in the event's history.

CHRIS BOURQUE

The son of Hockey Hall of Fame defenseman Ray Bourque, **Chris Bourque** carved out his own legendary career in the AHL as a three-time Calder Cup winner, a two-time league scoring champion and an MVP in both the regular season and the playoffs. Drafted by the Washington Capitals in 2004, Bourque won his first Calder Cup as a rookie with the Hershey Bears in 2006 and took on a starring role on the team's back-to-back championship teams in 2009 and 2010. Voted a First Team AHL All-Star on three occasions, Bourque totaled 746 points in 794 regular-season games with Portland, Hershey, Providence, Hartford and Bridgeport over his career, and also ranks among the league's all-time playoff leaders in assists (83, 1st), points (118, T-3rd) and games played (138, 2nd).



ALEXANDRE GIROUX

Alexandre Giroux was one of the most lethal offensive weapons in the AHL during his 11 seasons in the league, climbing all the way to seventh place on the all-time list with 368 career goals. His 2008-09 and 2009-10 seasons are among the greatest ever by an AHL player: in leading the Hershey Bears to back-to-back Calder Cups, Giroux won both league MVP honors and the regular-season scoring title in 2008-09; became the fourth player in league history with consecutive 50-goal campaigns; and was the fifth player ever to score 60 goals in a single season. He totaled 704 points in 771 contests with Grand Rapids, Binghamton, Hartford, Hershey, Chicago, Oklahoma City and Springfield, and added 103 points in 118 Calder Cup Playoff games, including a record five playoff OT goals.

JIM WIEMER

Jim Wiemer began his career as a left wing before transitioning to the blue line, where he became one of the AHL's premier two-way defensemen over a 14-year career. Drafted by the Buffalo Sabres in 1980, Wiemer helped the Rochester Americans win a Calder Cup title in 1983 and captured the Eddie Shore Award as the AHL's outstanding defenseman in 1985-86, when he recorded 24 goals and 73 points in 73 games for the New Haven Nighthawks. He spent many years as a reliable recall option: Wiemer played a total of 325 regular-season games and 62 playoff contests in the National Hockey League with five organizations, winning the Stanley Cup with Edmonton in 1988. He returned to Rochester to finish his career, retiring with 124 goals and 307 assists for 431 points in 548 AHL games.



WENDELL YOUNG

Currently in his 32nd season as a member of the Chicago Wolves organization, **Wendell Young** has followed a decorated playing career with a successful run as one of hockey's leading executives. Since the team's move to the AHL in 2001, Young has been instrumental in winning Calder Cup championships as Chicago's director of team relations (2002), assistant coach (2008) and general manager (2022), and during his 15 years as the Wolves' GM from 2009 to 2024 the team compiled a record of 571-375-136 (.591) while capturing eight division titles. As a player, Young made 138 appearances in the AHL highlighted by a 1987-88 season in which he won the "Baz" Bastien Award as the league's top goaltender and the Jack Butterfield Trophy as MVP of the Calder Cup Playoffs.
